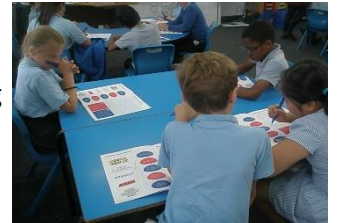
Science in the Park
