## From Miss Lim

As many of you may already know, next week, Year 6 pupils across the country will be sitting Standard Attainment Tests, commonly known as SATS. Every year the SATS tests are the subject of much debate in the media, as parents and teachers complain about the pressure put on children and the fact that results are only for the school's benefit, not the children's. Whatever your views are on the SATS, and testing children in general, I think it's important to remember the following:

- The children sit the tests in a familiar learning environment, supported by familiar staff. It is not in anyone's interest to create a high-pressured situation and we do everything we can to ensure the opposite is true.
- The longest test is 1 hour, which is no different from the amount of time they would spend learning in a typical lesson.
- The knowledge and skills they are tested on in each subject ensure they are well prepared to be successful in secondary school and able to access an exciting Key Stage 3 curriculum.
- Our Y6 pupils have not just been preparing for the SATS tests this year! Yes, they have had to do lots of work to help them prepare for the tests but practice tests ensure they will feel confident next week, not overwhelmed. And they have also had a huge number of fantastic learning experiences and been involved in art projects, dance and drama, sport and, of course, Scouting.
- The results are important for the school, there is no question about that, but that is because they are used by our multi-academy trust TKAT, the Department of Education and Ofsted as one way of measuring the quality of education we provide for every child at Weyfield. They are only one measure though and, as a school, we continue to do everything we can to ensure we measure what we value, not just value what we can measure.

I am incredibly proud of the way our Year 6 have worked this year and I know they will make the most of the opportunity next week to show off how much they have learned, so we can all celebrate how far they have come!
