From Miss Lim

Yesterday we had a visit from a Behaviour Specialist, Darrell, who works for Pivotal Education. Over the last few years we have established some clear and effective ways of promoting positive behaviour for learning at Weyfield – Good to be Green, Stars of the Week, other rewards and our personal goals – but there is always room for improvement; we are always striving to be better! So, we have chosen to work with Pivotal Education next year, an organisation with lots of experience of helping schools further embed a positive and inclusive culture, which will put the social and emotional needs of all our children right at the heart.

Let me be clear: this work is not happening because we have a behaviour problem at school or because we don’t already put the needs of our children at the forefront of everything. It is happening because we believe there is always more we can do for our pupils and we have chosen to partner with Pivotal because we share their values and beliefs about how children should be educated. (If you want further insight into this, I highly recommend reading Paul Dix’s book ‘When the adults change, everything changes’; Paul is the founder of Pivotal Education and incredibly inspiring!)

I am delighted that Darrell was overwhelmingly positive in his feedback. He spent the day wandering around the school, chatting to pupils and staff, observing lessons and eating lunch with the children. At the end of the day, he told me he was “buzzing” and that it had been a “truly memorable day”. He could see straight away how fantastic our children are and commented on how ready and eager they are to learn. He said it is clear that pupils know staff care about them and also that pupils help each other, in lessons and on the playground. None of this comes as a surprise to me but it is always lovely to hear it confirmed by a new visitor, and especially one with such experience who goes into 40-50 schools a year.

Darrell will be back in September to work with all the staff on our first day of term and he said he is excited to see how the school will continue to “bloom, blossom and grow” next year, as am I!

University of Surrey

Year 6 spent an interesting morning at Surrey University having taster sessions in the type of subjects they might be able to study at university, as well as finding out about university life and the clubs and societies that are likely to be on offer to university students.

Penalty Notices for Unauthorised Absence

Please be aware that The Education (Pupil Registration)(England) (Amendment) Regulations 2013 state that Headteachers may not grant any leave of absence during term time unless there are exceptional circumstances. The Headteacher should determine the number of school days a child can be away from school if leave is granted.

In accordance with the above Regulations, requests for leave of absence are treated sympathetically, but only in exceptional circumstances can they be approved. The policy of the Government, to which this school has agreed, states that parents who take their child out of school for five days or more during term time, without the authority of the Headteacher, will each be liable to receive a penalty notice. Penalty Notices will be issued by the Local Authority.

The penalty is £60 if paid within 21 days of receipt of the notice, rising to £120 if paid after 21 days but within 28 days of receipt of the notice. If the penalty is not paid in full by the end of the 28-day period the Local Authority must prosecute the recipient for failing to ensure regular school attendance under section 444 Education Act 1996.

Please be aware that each parent is liable to receive a Penalty Notice for each child who incurs unauthorised absences, for example, if there are two parents and one child, each parent will receive one Penalty Notice.

If there are two parents and two children incurring unauthorised absences, each parent will receive two Penalty Notices, which in this case would amount to £120 each if paid within 21 days.

Congratulations to Pear Class, who have the highest attendance this week of **97.64%**; they will be awarded golden time. This week's **whole-school attendance** is **93.92%**.
