Applications received after the closing date without good reason will be treated as late and will not be considered until all on time applications have been processed. This may jeopardise the chance of parents being offered one of their preferred schools for their child.

Time Team

Years 2 and 3 have been looking at Scavengers and Settlers. As part of their topic they have looked at the job of an archaeologist. On Wednesday, Godalming Museum visited the school with mini-dig kits for the children to excavate some buried treasures, so the children were able to take part in a Stone Age Dig and pretend to be archaeologists, uncovering coins, pieces of pottery and even a few bones from two different layers of soil and sand.

The children then had to record where items were found, what they looked like, their size and what they were made from, just as a real archaeologist would do. All the children were really excited to take part, but very respectful of the equipment they were using.
